ocated on the posher west coast of Phuket, with distant views of Kamala beach, Keemala might just be the most-photographed new hotel of 2016. Opened at the end of last year, its Hobbit-like landscape of thatched-roof cottages, coconut-shaped cabins, dangling treehouses and sculptural bird's nest villas is the stuff brochure designers' dreams are made of. Despite the playful aesthetic, the 38 villas boast stylish low-key interiors - think charcoals and cherry woods, circular sofas, dramatic netted beds and striking bathrooms with giant mosaic floors. Most also have private pools, while all come with the services of a butler-like host.

There may be just one restaurant, Su Tha, reached by a series of walkways suspended along the jungle canopy, but the menu provides plenty of variety. Split into three cuisines - Thai, Indian and Western - it's all you need. There's also a lagoonshaped pool with mini-waterfall, a gym with personal trainers and the wonderful Mala Spa.

Secreted in a series of luxed-up huts with sea views and private steam chambers, Keemala's spa is a real highlight. A thoughtful menu offers everything from traditional treatments to more unconventional options such as raindrop healing, chakra rebalancing and singing bowl therapy. 


EYE-CANDY
